G-3 READING COPY

1. As requested by an investigator of your command, Mr. Oscar R. Nagsarili, special investigator, the following information is submitted pertaining to the guerrilla activities of Mr. Herbert Barr.

2. Mr. Barr is not a recognized guerrilla and there is indication that he did not subscribe to the guerrilla resistance movement.

On 25 August 1944, subject individual arrived at Col Edward I. Anderson's headquarters then located at Maniga (Salanga Point) Submarine Base, Infanta, Cebu. His point of origin was Hinal. The undersigned met with **W. A. METTS, Jr.** as the executive officer of Col Anderson.

Mr. Barr remained within Col Anderson's headquarters perimeter without making any attempts or offers to assist in guerrilla operations of the movement. He remained in a sign shack supported by a few local civilians. His main interest was in feeding himself and staying alive.

The undersigned often visited Mr. Barr in this sign shack. At times, Mr. Barr voiced his opinion against the guerrillas, and against Col Anderson. He stated that he would have nothing to do with the resistance movement.

On or about October 1944, Mr. Barr moved to about twenty miles to the Ilog River and remained in hiding here until the

At Col Anderson's headquarters, submarines were discharging fuel, supplies and equipment. Mr. Barr's technical knowledge and skills would have been of great value in maintaining and repairing generators, charge and signal equipment. However, he refused to render this service.

From personal observation, it is concluded that Mr. Herbert Barr is of a selfish character, long, talkative beyond reason and stubborn. He would be of no value to the armed forces in a combat zone or theatre. He has no sense of security discipline.

There is no personal animosity existing between the subject individual and the undersigned. The aforementioned information is given in view of the fact that the undersigned has been informed to the effect that Mr. Barr has requested some form of compensation or award for services "rendered" during the occupation.

1. This is to certify that the following information on Mr. Herbert A Barr is correct and true to the best of my knowledge and belief:

a. That o/a August 1944, subject individual arrived at Col Bernard L Anderson's headquarters then located at Masanga (Salanga Point) Submarine Base, Infanta, Quezon. His point of origin was Rizal. The undersigned was at Masanga at this time as the executive officer of Col Anderson.

b. Mr Barr remained within Col Anderson's headquarters perimeter without making any attempts or offers to assist in guerrilla operations of the movement. He remained in a nipa shack supported by a few local civilians. His main interest was in feeding himself and staying alive.

c. The undersigned often visited Mr. Barr in this nipa shack. In most instances, Mr Barr voiced his opinion against the guerrillas, especially against Col Anderson. He stated that he would have nothing to do with the resistance movement.

d. On or about October 1944, Mr. Barr moved to about twenty miles north to the Umiray River and remained in hiding here until the liberation.

e. At Col Anderson's headquarters, submarines were discharging valuable supplies and equipment. Mr. Barr's technical knowledge and services would have been of great value in maintaining and repairing generators, charges and signal equipment. However, he refused to render this service.

2. From personal observation, it is concluded that Mr. Herbert Barr is of a dubious character, lazy, talkative beyond reason and stubborn. He would be of no value to the Armed Forces in a combat zone or theatre. He has no sense of security discipline.

3. There is no personal animosity existing between the subject individual and the undersigned. The aforementioned information is given in view of the fact that the undersigned has been informed to the effect that Mr. Barr has requested some form of commendation or award for services "rendered" during the occupation"
