

STATEMENT OF THE CASE:

The accused herein were all prosecuted for violation of the provision of the 95th Article of War. On 5 Webruary 1946, they were all arraigned before the Special Court Martial, under the same charge and specification and all of them pleaded NOT GUILTI to both charge and specification. There being no motion for separate trial filed by any one of them, the court proceeded to try their case jointly for the same charge and she specification thereunded.

BVIDERGE .-

For the Prosecution: On or about 1830 hours, 5 January 1946, the soursed were all apprehended by Maj. Salvador, the than Provest Marshal, at Camp Murphy, while they were with the army truck partial Santolan read near the place of the 2nd Army Band. The Provest Marshal finding three sacks of rice in the truck quarted the accused about it answered that they intended to sell the same to the members of the Army Band. Just then the accused were turned over to the MP Detachment for investigation. It Scroan and it Pascual conducted the investigation and in the said investigation, it appeared that they were assigned to had rice in the said investigation. Coming back to Camp Murphy, they unloaded the rice in the Camp Bodega. After the unloading there were three sacks left which could have been an overage in their requisition. Sgt. Aguirre testified that he consulted it Garcia about the overage to which fact it. Garcia instructed him to leave the rice in the truck for furkher disposition.

The intended sale to the members of the Army Band of the said rice was frustrated on accout of the errival of the Provest Marshal who effected the

apprehension of the accused.


The Shorage Officer testified that he assigned the accused to haul rice on 5 January 1946. That the accused were atthice unload 100 same of rice in the Bodega, after which there were left three (3) more sacks in the truck. The accused were instructed to leave the rice in the truck and inspite of the said instruction, they left and took the wice with them. The intended sale of the said rice was revealed by one of the witnesses, Pvt. Are who was also detailed to haul rice but went home after unloaded due to an understanding that he will be given a share in the proceeds of the same.

For the Defense. The accused after being duly warned of their rights by the defense counsel and the Court, elected to testify under oath, restricting their testimony to the charge and specification herein. They testified in substance as follows: They were assigned to heal rice from the Depot at Base X, on 5 January 1946. After coming from the Depot they proceeded to Camp Murphy and reported to Lt. Garcia, storage officer, who instructed them to unload the macks of rice to the Camp Bedega. After unloading they found out that there was an overage of three (3) each of rice which were left in the truck.

Sgt. Aguirre testified that he consulted Lt. Garcia about the overage and said officer instructed him to leave the rice in the truck for he was too bosy checking other supplies that just arrived. In the meanwhile, they went out of Camp to eat their supper and parked the truck on the road to Santolan near the place of the 2nd Army Band.

They were apprehended by an officer who came down from a command car and later identified as Major Salvador, Provost Marshal at Camp Hurphy, who took them to the office of the MP Detachment for investigation.

The accused denied baving had the intention to sell the rice to the members of the Army Hand This testimpnies created a descripancy of facts adduced during the pre-trial investigation of this case in that they seadmitted their intended cale of the said rice.



CONDUMBE.

The record is legally sufficient to support the findings and sentence.

The crime imputed to the accused was fully established by the prosecuand uncontradicted by the defence with the aggravating circumstances of nocbernity and use of vehicle to conceal the cladestine act. However, we could not
sustain the contention that the accused cluded the guards for the reason that
the guards should always be on the alert to impose his power and authority
during his period of detail. To sustain this idea would be giving cause for
believing that the guards were posligient in the performance of their duties
or that they have not done their at all.

The court properly considered the previousl convintion of one of the accused. Leopoldo Prudencio, and therefore the maximum penalty imposed upon

him is slee proper.

There was no finding of previous convictions with respect to the other accused.

There were no errors or irregularities committed which injuriously affected the substantial rights of the accused.

RECOMMENDATION .-

- a. Civilian background. The accused are all single, young in age and fair education. They have a sorking knowledge of the English language. Before enlisting in the army they are all students in the high school except the other accused Leopoldo Frudencio, who barely reached the 4th grade elementary education. They have no civilian police record and consequently they have a fair civilian background.
- b. Military background. The accused Leopoldo Prudencio, is an ExUsaffee He enlisted in the army on September 1941 and during the Estean
 Compaign he was confined in the Little Regule, up to the surrender of Bataan
 in 1942. The accused were forcer numbers of the Guerrilla Forces, stationed
 in the Central Luzon Provinces. They have no prior service in the Army, be
 fore joining the Guerrilla Forces, except the little training in the high
 school. They have no record of conviction since the date they were processed
 except this one. With respect to the accused Leopoldo Prudencio, he was
 formerly convicted by the court for violation of the 95th AV, on 13 October
 1945.
- c. Recommended action. The accused have fair civilian and military background and although they committed the crime imputed against them it is nontheless serious. The court after considering the previous conviction of the accused Leopoldo Prudencio, properly impose the maximum penalty. The sentence of the court indicated above is not excessive. It is therefore recommended that the sentence be approved and will be duly executed. The Camp Stockade at Camp Murphy, Rizal is the appropriate place of confinement.


