

5. Be always on your guard and keep your men on the alert for "eternal Vigilance is the price of Liberty."

TEMPORARY DUTIES OF ARMED FORCES OF NORTHERN LUZON

As stated above there will be no armed resistance against Japanese forces in Northern Luzon due to the fact that any such action taken against them, until our American forces land in the Philippines, would only result in retaliation by shooting or further our own Phil-American prisoners.

^{Abusing} It is further ordered that for the time being in each municipality a small armed detachment will be maintained for police duties only. They are not to have authority outside

the municipality. The arms and ammunition are to be inventoried and hidden until such time as they will be called for by the Commanding Officer of the Province. In the meantime list of arms and ammunition in the respective municipalities will be taken and submitted to their respective headquarters. It is further ordered that the arms and ammunition in respective municipalities under no circumstances are to be given up or surrendered to anyone without orders from Provincial U. S. Army headquarters.

There undoubtedly will be an outbreak of gangsters and hoodlums. To suppress them, it is the duty of the armed detachments to stop such outbreaks. It is further ordered that each municipality will have to handle all such cases. Records of cases dealt with will be taken and kept until civil government has been restored. Any and all gang fighting between Filipinos will be summarily dealt with, even the extreme of turning over the offenders to the Japanese authorities. Hoodlums and gangsters are to be suppressed at all costs.

It is further ordered that for the time being in each municipality a small armed detachment will be maintained for police duties only. They are not to have authority outside of their municipalities. All arms and ammunition are to be taken care of by the Commanding Officer in that area. The arms and ammunition are to be inventoried and hidden until such time as they will be called for by the Commanding Officer of the Province. In the meantime list of arms and ammunition in the respective municipalities will be taken and submitted to their respective headquarters. It is further ordered that the arms and ammunition in respective municipalities under no circumstances are to be given up or surrendered to anyone without orders from Provincial U. S. Army headquarters.

There undoubtedly will be an outbreak of gangsters and hoodlums. To suppress them, it is the duty of the armed detachments to stop such outbreaks. It is further ordered that each municipality will have to handle all such cases. Records of cases dealt with will be taken and kept until civil government has been restored. Any and all gang fighting between Philippines will be summarily dealt with, even the extreme of turning over the offenders to the Japanese authorities. Hoodlums and gangsters are to be suppressed at all costs.






