1. On the 15th day of August 1945 at about 2200, I went with Lt Col BALAO, CO of the 121st Imf, into the tent for senior officers' mess at LOO, Benguet, where we found a poker game going on. In that poker game were Major ALIPIO CUBAS, Ex O, 121st Inf; Capt Caspar Quinsaar, Ex O, 2nd Bm, 121st Inf; Capt Jaime Miranda, CO, Ho Ba, 121st Inf; and Pvt JULIO MON. When we came in, Pvt MON left the table so It Col Balad and I joined them to a friendly game of poker. I was interested in joining this game because I have heard in the past that Capt MIRANDA had won several thousand pesos from his fellow officers and some EM. After playing for a few minutes, It Col BALAO lost fairly heavy so he stood up and left the poker table and went to sleep so that he left us four only in the game. I noticed that either Capt QUINSAAT or Capt MIRANDA won the game in almost every deal. For example, you draw 4 sixes, Capt MIRANDA or Capt QUINSAAT would outdraw you with 4 sevens; if you got 4 kings, he gets 4 aces depending as to who is in the game between the two. And if you got a high hand and they did not hold any card higher than yours in their hand, they will just conveniently drop out of the game.

2. Being an old poker player myself, I began to suspect that the game was not on the level because normally, in a play with stakes as high as it was and as reckless as they played, their chances would have been very slim. They would be losers in a short order. Being suspicious, I called their attention to the manner how they deal the cards by reminding them the Rules or Games of Cards by Hoyle that the cards should be dealt on the table and not to hold them on their hands. However, that did not change the trend of the game. We were playing on cut or stripped deck from sixes to aces. The only games that they would play were 7 cards stud, five cards stud and straight draw. These kind of games give a decided adventage to the player or players who know the closed cards of his opponent as well as the cards that are to come. One time I suggested to them a game of American High-Low poker but Major CUBAS said that they did not know how to play High-Low.

Note: "In High-Low poker the probabilities to win ever for a crooked gambler is very difficult because it is purely a game of chance."

3. I started to watch the eyes of Capt QUINSAAT and Capt MIRANDA as they deal a card and noticed immediately that their eyes were focused intently on the back of every card given to every player, a characteristic very peculiar in a friendly game. Therefore, I began to suspect that the cards were marked. So merely out of my curiosity I picked up a queen and looked at the back of it and I noticed a few visible little spots. Then I took the deck and looked on the backs of all the cards. Knowing the trade secrets of a "card shark", I picked out a card with similar markings on it and to my astonishment and surprise the cards happened to be another queen. Then I started looking on the other cards and on one of them, I noticed 10 little dots marked intentionally by a man whose intentions were not homorable. I looked for another card with 10 little dots on it and as I turned the card over I found to my surprise that the two cards turned out to be all tens. I was them convinced that the cards were marked. It became therefore my duty to stop the game immediately and the two "card sharks" must be placed under arrest and the cards they were playing with have to be confiscated and turned over to the proper authority for investigation. I told Major CUBAS to place the men under arrest but he refused to do so. I told Major CUBAS that if he did not place them under arrest that I would arrest him too. I ordered him to leave the tent and told an EM to wake up Lt Col BALAO, the CO of the regiment. When I searched Capt MIRANDA I found another deck of marked cards in his pocket which was probably used as switching deck. I took the two decks of cards and all the money that was on the table which amounted to a respectable sum of \$5,774.00. The cards and the money were turned over to the Infantry Commander, Lt Col CALVERT at the Advance Echelon, GHQ for safekeeping.

- 4. When Lt Col BALAO came into the test he was very reluctant to place those officers under arrest, which led me to suspect that he and Major CUBAS are is some way or another complicated into the matter, or being gentlementy about it, they probably have a little knowledge of what has been going on in the way of an organized racket conducted by Captains MIRANDA and QUINSAAT.
- 5. It has been further found when the above-named officers were investigated that they have played and victimized officers and EM of their commands.
 - 6. In view of the foregoing, it is recommended that

disciplinary action be taken against Capt MIRANDA and Capt QUINSAAT for using fraud in gambling with EM and officers. It is further recommended that the promissory notes signed by the officers and EM be returned to the respective promissors. As to the money taken from them, let the proper authority decide as to what disposition should be made work it.
