**Information:** Same as in previous report, except that the two drivers of Van Carlos has been observed to be fortified, and that the critics consider as allied bombing at Port are being directed at In Saigon the enemy is using disguised foxholes, and building bunkers.

#### b. ENEMY UNITS (See 1-a)

##### 1. MOBILES:

a. Combat Value -- Fairly trained

b. Equipment of Corps -- Fair

c. Discipline - None

d. Morale -- Very poor. They are afraid to go into the towns, and are afraid to go into the countryside.

e. Fighting capacity -- Not determined yet. It has been observed that they are mixing combat with raids. Some of them are well equipped (Lt. Aggressor), while others are not. (Lt. Aggressor) f. Leadership -- Good. g. Organization -- Inadequate, but they have many scattered elements (Lt. Aggressor). h. Military tactics - Fairly good.

##### 2. MARCHING UNITS:

a. Disciplines - As in previous reports. b. Reconnaissance - Very good, but not necessarily like. They have enough arms and arms to fight and fight.

c. Equipment - In Central Laos, there is a section of six (6) boxes of air mines from America.

In Langay Ridge there are eight (8) LIP mines which are concealed with coconuts and palm leaves.

Under the name of Van Carlos today there are fourteen (14) boxes of mines for trucks and tanks.

d. Leadership - Poor. They have been overruled by their first officer, Van Carlos. They get their leadership from their officers and leaders. It was observed that they are not afraid to fight even though they are unarmed. (Lt. Aggressor)

##### 3. TRANSPORT UNITS:

a. Internal Affairs - The maintenance of roads and tracks.

b. External Affairs - They are responsible to help civilians.

##### 4. SUPPORT UNITS:

a. Supply - 17 Jan 1968 - Two (2) trucks from Central Laos came to Langay Ridge with 30 men, they were armed with 27-6 mm (0.50 calibre) machine rifles, two (2) 0.30 cal. and 16mm type 91 (1955) light A-1. 1-50mm RPGs by grenade launcher, AKM and PKM and RPGs of same day.

-1 17 Jan 1968 - One (1) truck loaded with supplies,

-2 17 Jan 1968 - officers went to Langay Ridge Central Laos to see the mine fields and discuss the problem.

-3 17 Jan 1968 - One (1) truck (0.50 calibre) and 16mm rifles and several RPGs by grenade launcher. Returned at 1800 hrs of same day.

-4 1800 hrs, 17 Jan 1968 - One (1) truck loaded with supplies and 30 men. They were armed with 27-6 mm (0.50 calibre) machine rifles, 1-60 cal. Heavy Machine Gun and 1-50mm RPGs by grenade launcher of same day.

-5 1800 hrs, 17 Jan 1968 - 15 soldiers and 30 men with their food provision to escape the traps laid by the Americans on the road about 17-18 Km (0.50 calibre) machine rifles, 1-60 cal. Heavy Machine Gun and 1-50mm RPGs by grenade launcher of same day. Returned at 1800 hrs of same day. 3000 hrs, 18 Jan 1968 - 30 men armed with 27-6 mm (0.50 calibre) machine rifles and 16mm RPGs by grenade launcher. These men are said to kill their captives and shoot them to the civilians. They returned 1800 hrs of same day to Central Laos.

1600 hrs, 18 Jan '45- 3 trucks from Monterrey arrived Central Lopez loaded with 20 Nips armed with 4-6-mm (0.256 inch) Type 92 (1926) 41mm (0.160 inch) Type 92 (1926) and several handgrenades.

2100 hrs, 18 Jan '45- 1 truck from Monterrey arrived Sager river with 12 men armed with 4-6-mm (0.256 inch) and 41mm (0.160 inch) Type 92 (1926) and several handgrenades.

1800 hrs, 20 Jan '45- 3 Nips from Monterrey went to ranches near Little Vitcivit. They were armed with 4-6-mm (0.256 inch) and 41mm (0.160 inch) Type 92 (1926) and several handgrenades. At 1600 hrs of same day they returned. (Lt. Legaspi)

1600 hrs, 20 Jan '45- 1 truck from Central Lopez loaded with 12 Nips went to Crossing Sager. They were armed with 4-6-mm (0.256 inch) Type 92 (1926) 41mm (0.160 inch) Type 92 (1926) and several handgrenades. At 1800 hrs of same day they returned. (Lt. Legaspi)

1800 hrs, 21 Jan '45- 3 Japs Engineers armed with 8-0.5mm (0.256 inch) and 8AKA rifles went across San Agustin on foot. They asked Nips, Villagers and the District civilians. At 1800 hrs of same day they returned to Central Lopez. (Lt. Legaspi)

1800 hrs, 21 Jan '45- 1 truck from Central Lopez loaded with 7 Nip soldiers went to Crossing Sager. Armed with 8-0.5mm (0.256 inch) and 8AKA rifles and handgrenades. At 1700 hrs of same day they returned. (Lt. Legaspi)

SACADO- 1700 hrs, 21 Jan '45- 1 Nip was either killed or wounded when he attempted to catch a civilian planted as a decoy by our boys 300 yards from the Commissary Store. 12 Nips tried to encircle the said decoy but our boys detected the plan and the plan was foiled. Nip went back to the garrison. (Lt. Legaspi)

1800 hrs, 22 Jan '45- 3 Nips with civilians went out the garrison 300 yards from the barb wire fence the town to gather vegetables and fuel. Our boys fired at them and inflicted 3 civilians. (Lt. Legaspi)

SACADO- 2000 hrs, 22 Jan '45- 36 Nips from Central Lopez went to the oil on foot bringing with them their arms to escape from bombing. At 1800 hrs of same day they returned.

0800 hrs, 23 Jan '45- 1 truck from Central Lopez went to Crossing Sager loaded with 7 Nips armed with 4-6-mm (0.256 inch) and 41mm (0.160 inch) Type 92 (1926) Nips. Returned at 1800 hrs of same day (Lt. Legaspi)

1200 hrs, 23 Jan '45- 3 Nips from Monterrey went to the Command to look for cartridges. They were armed with 4-6-mm (0.256 inch) and 8AKA rifles. Returned at 1800 hrs of same day. (Lt. Legaspi)

1800 hrs, 23 Jan '45- 3 trucks from Monterrey went to the landing field loaded with 20 Nips and many civilians. They leveled the both ends of a road by the 1800 hrs bombing. Returned 0700 hrs, 24 Jan '45. (Lt. Legaspi)

0800 hrs, 24 Jan '45- 1 car and truck with 8 Nips and armed with 8AKA (0.307 inch) and 8AKA rifles went to Sager. Returned at 1700 hrs of same day. (Lt. Legaspi)

1800 hrs, 24 Jan '45- 3 Nips with 3 civilians went out the 20,000 300 yards from the barb wire fence the town to forage for some necessities. Our boys fired upon them. No casualties. Nip about 100 feet away. (Lt. Legaspi)

1800 hrs, 24 Jan '45- 3 High Poles (Caisa) Garrison armed with 4-6-mm (0.256 inch) and 41mm (0.160 inch) Type 92 (1926) and several handgrenades went to Rio Columbia to loot chickens from the civilians. They returned at 1700 hrs of same day.

1800 hrs, 24 Jan '45- 3 trucks from Monterrey loaded with 12 Nips and 3000 lbs of rice for Central Lopez. The soldiers were all armed with 8AKA rifles only.

1000 mls of same day. (At 10 a.m.)  
100 ml. 25% A.S.P.E. mixed with 0.5% NaCl  
10 ml. 1/1000 S. and P. suspension must be followed  
by instillation of 0.5% NaCl from 5 ml. bulb. Then instillate  
as follows of same day. (At 10 a.m.)

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1. 120mm, 20 Jan 1944 - A bridge from Salter's went to the  
longest of the bridges with 20' x 10' floor. The bridge was  
in the middle of the stream destruction. It had a radius of the  
longest bending, and required 1600 ft of sand bags. (to do 40' in  
100' drop) 20 Jan 1944 - A bridge from Salter's to the  
crossing point became over 20' wide, broken with 10' x 10' radii  
and 20'-0 LHM (4.63 meter) ARIEKA piston, 2-2, 2000  
(1.000 meter) 1/2" 100' (100' long) about 100' (30m) above  
the bridge. The bridge was 10' (3m) wide.

1940 May, 20 Jun 1941 - Troops and 1 automobile were loaded with 70 US soldiers (estimated strength). Under verification, 100 men of whom only three (by name) Greeks went back to Standard Intermediate Hospital. (at 1940)

1940 May, 20 Jun 1941 - US soldiers and civilians were returning home from Italy (mostly) now attached to the American 1st Inf Div. 1000000 men of the government hospital and were being held to intercept allied planes. (at Salerno) (about 1940-41) Indians were sent out to verify this great accusation of the fortification.

... 1000 hrs, by 140-2 group, located with C. 7th Battalion sent to the landing field to move. They were armed with several P-40 (S-200 then), Infantry rifles and 1-2 base (S-200)

inch) type 10 (1800) mm. Towed back across river to crossing point, at 0800 hrs - a truck from 1st rice went to crossing bridge with 8 men and 10 horses. At 1000 hrs (0.856 inch) 1000 mm. trailer, (10 Legris) at 1700 hrs of same day they returned.

1000 mts. so same two - 10 hrs spent to sight each dog, 2 hrs  
left to forage. (Lt. 10 hrs, 10)  
1000 mts. so same two - 10 hrs - armed with 160.000 (0.155  
inch) M16A1 rifles provided with stability on for forage  
purposes. (Lt. 10 hrs per day)

KILO 100, 30 min. after start of bombardment number three determined effort to return attack to air ("final") but was repulsed by heavy opposition by the Japs. No further effort made for almost half an hour. The Japs however took 10000 rounds of AA fire unopposed. None on our side.

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## General Movements (Cont'd.)

0800' North Latitude,  $10^{\circ} 28'$  East Longitude; from the North heading South. (Lt. Legaspi)

0800 hrs, 26 Jan '45- One Victor Able crossed at  $10^{\circ}$  North Latitude and  $49^{\circ}$  Longitude. Dug at the fisherman near it out there were no casualties inflicted. Direction from North to South. (Lt. Legaspi)

1500 hrs, 26 Jan '45- Victor Able crossed at 0800 hrs while losing one boat with long-distance, however, most probably long wave radio equipment to CMGCO. This was from North. (Lt. Legaspi)

0800 hrs, 26 Jan '45- Victor Able and 1 boat decked at 0800 hrs there were three upon us. The 50 cal. was employed at the survivors of San Domingo. At 1100 hrs, the boat was received by the NTB to cross back to San Domingo; the Victor Able also undergoing major repairs. (Lt. Legaspi)

1200 hrs, 26 Jan '45- Victor Able left Gov't wharf bound north probably to Maricor heavily loaded with un-known cargo. (Lt. Legaspi)

1500 hrs, 26 Jan '45- Victor Able left SCMCO wharf bound North, probably to Maricor, loaded with ~~probable~~ sixty (60) SF's and other cargo; most probably G-1 sheets encircling wires and steel. (Lt. Legaspi)

## III. SERIAL MOVEMENTS:- See attached tabulated form.

## IV. RECENT OUTINGS:

0700 hrs, 16 Jan '45- 8 allied planes strafed SMU by garrison and Timog. 3 Jap soldiers aiming in the civilian houses near Timog were hit and killed. 0740 of same day, 8 allied planes bombed Songko. Ammunition tanks were hit and burned; trenches and foxholes were directly hit but however there was no causality in factees on the part of the enemy. This attack caused the Japs to evacuate to the about 500 meters NW from Numancia Numancia School and to Songko a few of Central houses on the other bank of the river. (Lt. Legaspi)

0000 hrs, 16 Jan '45- 1 truck went to Crossing Party loaded with 8 Jap soldiers. They inspected the road where the blocking of the INT bridge took place. (Lt. Leg. Spina)

1000 hrs daily 200 soldiers return to San Domingo, saying uniformly to 1000 footmiles from the civilians. They are armed with various (0126 inch) ARRAFA rifles returned in the after noon. (Lt. Leg. Spina)

16 Jan '45- In the middle of the left wing of San Domingo elementary school is heavily barricaded with thick lumber and mill boxes. Part of the flooring about 1 meter wider is cut off as an exit to the rear out under one of the trenches both ends are west of said room. The construction of the trenches is 1 meter deep, 1 1/2 meters wide at the mouth and 1 meter less at the base with the approximate length of 50 meters extending east. (Lt. Leg. Spina)

The air raid shelter is located about 15 meters to the right of the stairs and is form 30 to 40 meters east from the edge of the left wing, these are connected with trenches. (Lt. Leg. Spina)

17 Jan '45- At present there are 6 tracks stationed at Mariano and Carlos Lopez's houses. These tracks are used in case of any eventuality. (Lt. Legaspi)

1600 hrs, 17 Jan '45- 3 allied planes bombed and strafed Central Lopez area and hit Mariano's house and Central dock. 4 tracks were hit and burned. Two families in Mariano's house were burned and 7 Jap soldiers were killed. In Central dock 4 Jap soldiers were killed and 3 wounded, rendering the dock useless. Some of the bombs hit near San Jose's house (Lt. Legaspi)

1620 hrs, 18 Jan '45- Lane was crushed off

Indecisive gas hour survivors return. 15 minutes after the  
Cease fire went into effect, 1200 hrs, 20 Jan '45-18 allied planes bombed the landing  
field; some bombs were released near Sangay and houses,  
and San Carlos, which is about 2 1/2 hrs. east of the landing  
field. Damage hit. It was observed that Japanese soldiers  
work 2 hours every night repairing the damages in the San  
Carlos area. (Lt. Legespine)

20 Jan '45- The enemy has the following to reveal the  
victims of the bombing to measure of 4 kms. from their garrison  
to look for our soldiers and no foreign troops left. (Lt.  
Legespine)

1700 hrs, 21 Jan '45-2 ocean landed裴�ice airport. There  
are 4 Oscars presently stationed at the said airport.

The enemy are still working at night in the San Carlos air  
field. (Lt. Legespine)

1800 hrs, 22 Jan '45- 8 allied planes tried to strafe  
Sangay Garrison but they were fired first by the ACK guns. No  
casualty on both sides.

The Japs are observed eating rice mixed with casotes  
due to the shortage of rice. (Lt. Legespine)

200 hrs, 22 Jan '45- P MINE were observed hit by auto-  
matic rifle at "L" battery under Lt. Rodriguez on patrol in  
the San Carlos area. (Lt. Maltaco)

21 Jan '45- 18 NIDS dropped at San Carlos about 20 (mobile  
patrol). The fort was in CGCC. These NIDS that replaced  
the previous division in the town are mobile and aggress-  
ive. (Lt. Maltaco)

The government wharf at the town proper is being fortified  
by the Japs. Inconcrete location of the fortification is under  
verification. From plate (plane) the steel from the Electric  
plant were the materials being used for fortification. Civil-  
ians in the central (CGCC) are being utilized for the project  
under the supervision of the Japs soldiers. (Lt. Maltaco)

0100 hrs, 23 Jan '45- Japs still occupy town of San Carlos.  
Our boys are occupying positions outside of the town. (Lt.  
Maltaco).

0700 hrs, 24 Jan '45- 4 allied planes bombed and strafed  
Safety garrison was directly hit; 2 ACM AGW guns destroyed  
4 NIDS killed; part of the house of Mr. Macero Lopez was  
damaged. (Lt. Legespine).

0730 hrs, of same day, 4 allied planes bombed and strafed  
Same place. Result:- No casualties was inflicted. (Lt. Le-  
gespine)

#### ENEMY INTENTIONS AND WISCONSINS:

San Carlos - Strong defense of San Carlos is  
been made by the Japs. It is fully capable of defending and main-  
taining her present position. There is still no indication as  
far that the enemy will withdraw San Carlos because of its  
strategic location. It has also lately been observed that  
the two divisions of San Carlos are being fortified.

The Japs intent is however, stronger than San Carlos.  
So this still believed that they are very much able  
to launch counter-offensive, if they report to against the  
friendly unit in that area. This is shown by the regathering  
of the San Carlos (monitors).

They must have known the American campaign both in the  
Visayan, Mindanao and in Luzon where so that before the cap-  
ture of American landing in this island, they will concentrate  
to the San Carlos to join a bigger force soon probably by sea due  
to the construction of beaches in Bacoor Bay, one of the  
regarding of the French and British at San Carlos will be  
done.

CONCLUSION- Our soldiers will always be put into account.

**A - COMBAT INTELLIGENCE:**

**1 - Ground Forces:**

a - Estimated enemy strength:

72D FA REGT AREA - - - - - All clear.

SAN CARLOS AREA (SCMCO) - - 81 Japs - all Infantry.

b - Unit Commanders - Lieut. K. Nozawa.

c - Armaments - 1 Heavy Grenade Thrower; 1 Anti-Tank Rifle, cal. 50; 2 ARs, cal. 7.7mm; Unverified number of Type 96, M1936 Light Machine Guns, TGS and ARISAKA Rifles, cal. 6.55mm and Hand Grenades.

d - Defensive installations - As ~~12~~ many defensive installations are foxholes, trenches, sand bag emplacements, air-raid shelters under their quarters and barbed wire fences.

e - Supply:

Ammunition - It is still admitted they have enough in San Carlos to fight out our forces in case we launch our attack. It is true, many ammunition dumps were already burned as result of continuous Allied bombings, but this particular unit have their own stock may be still untouched, especially those dropped by plane last 27 Nov '44.

Food - Plenty of corn stored as reported. Even civilians that are now with them will live dependently on this reported storage of corn, it is believed, without doubt, we could not starve them even for two months to come. They will, however, be hard-up with viands.

f - Transportation and communication - Only water transportation possible at present. Bridges between Calatrava and San Carlos reported destroyed.

g - Spies, collaborators, puppets, etc. - All except those that still stick and live with the Japs for obvious reasons, were apprehended and detained for preliminary investigation after which they will be disposed of in accordance with instructions. There are some persons wanted that could not be accounted for, having sought refuge to areas where they are unknown. Those with the Japs are tongue-tied what to do - they at last realized their doom is near.

h - Ground movements - 7 Dec '44 at 0930 hours an estimated number of 40 Japs went as far as San Jose Bridge, San Carlos, riding on armored truck probably to save the pilot and to salvage the enemy plane that crashed in Hds San Jose. The truck was fired at by our boys near San Jose Bridge and there was an exchange of fire for few minutes without casualty on both sides. They could not locate the pilot nor the plane and they returned to the Central at 1200 hours.

A - COMBAT INTELLIGENCE:-

1 - Ground Forces:

a - Estimated enemy strength:

1. 72D FA REGT - All clear.

2. San Carlos Area:

(a) 19 Nov '44 - Japs - 77

(b) 27 Nov '44 - " - 107

(c) Total estimated enemy strength 30 Nov '44 - 81 Japs.

REMARKS: Reinforcement of 30 Japs via motorized sailboat landed on 27 Nov '44. They were opposed by our units inflicting to the enemy 7 casualties. 16 were reported dead during encounter of 29 Nov '44. Wounded - 7; 3 of them reported dead. Total enemy casualties during the operation from 20 Nov to 29 Nov '44 - 26.

b - Location and Nature of Defense Installations: See sketch.

c - Unit Commander - Capt. K. Nozawa.

d - Unit - All Infantry.

e - Armaments - 1 Heavy Grenade Thrower; 1 Anti-Tank Rifle, Cal. 50; 2 ARs, cal. 7.7mm; Unverified number of Type 95, M1936 Light Machine Gun, Cal. 6.55 mm(0.256 inch) and rifles, cal. 6.55 mm (0.256 inch).

f - Supply:

1. Ammunition - Quantity of ammunition is unverified, but it is presumed that the enemy has plenty because they seemed not economizing in returning fire to our units during the operation. 27 Nov '44, enemy plane dropped 2 bags within area believed to be ammunition and food supply.

2. Food - The enemy has enough to last for months. Considerable quantity of shelled corn reported stored. See sketch.

3. Water - Good water supply is available within the area of SCMCO. No chance to cut this water supply at present. See sketch.

4. Fuel - Great quantity of Coco Oil is deposited. Alcohol could be had either from Fabrica or Bacolod.

g - Transportation and communication: Only water transportation is available for the enemy in San Carlos. Bridges between Calatrava and San Carlos reported destroyed.

h - Terrain not under our control. SCMCO and the town proper is still controlled by the enemy.

i - Spies, Collaborators, Puppets and Sympathizers: - All suspected spies, collaborators, puppets and sympathizers with the exception of Villamero and Castillo that sought refuge to our areas were arrested and detained. They are now under the custody of the Bn S-2, 1st Bn for which investigation is still in process.

j - Ground Movements:

1. 29 Nov '44 at 4:00 AM, the enemy repulse our forces and penetrated our lines thru left flank held by the 3rd Bn., 72D FA and partly by engr Bn; burned big houses, despite stiff resistance offered by our boys (See sketch where burned houses are being indicated).

2. Civilians in San Carlos numbering around 4,000 evacuated San Carlos after the 2nd raid.
3. 100 civilians more or less are reported hiding with the Japs in SCMCO. Among them are Villamero and Castillo who are wanted by our forces.
4. A tunnel is made under the Mill building where the civilians are hiding. This tunnel is furnished with electric light and food supplies to last them for months. ✓ 20

VI. ENEMY CAPABILITIES AND INTENTIONS:

1. Enemy intention is under study. However, burning the town is an indication to leave either for Fabrics or Cebu. Non-presence of civilians who were before in close collaboration with them.
2. The bulwark defenses installed by the enemy indicates the invulnerability of the Japs which is beyond the destructive capacity of the present weapons used by our forces. Burning of the center area of the town paves a good field of fire by enemy snipers.

g. DEFENSIVE INSTALLATIONS. - Enemy defensive installations are fox-holes, trenches, sand bag emplacements, air raid shelters under their quarters and barbed wire fences.

- (a) Combat value - Good
- (b) Esprit de Corp - Fair
- (c) Desertion rate - None
- (d) Health - There are cases of malaria and tropical ulcers reported.
- (e) Rations - Three (3) meals is still served, but they are beginning to economize. In Bagay Area they foraged for root crops.
- (f) Adequacy of clothing - In Bagay area they have inadequate clothing. Soldiers were seen using clothings with big patches. In San Carlos area, they are better clothes. Soldiers looted the civilian houses thereat after the withdrawal of our forces during the November Operation.
- (g) Relations between officers and men - Excellent. This is so because of their fanatical belief. They never disobey superiors.



2. Food - SCHICO GARRISON - Altho the Japs incise SCHICO are no longer forcing for food because of the presence of our troops around, we could not starve them for two months to come. Plenty corn reported stored in Bacaga No. 3. SAGAY AREA - They also ~~have~~ sufficient stock. In case of food shortage, they could still get in Bacelco, which is presumed plenty is stored. ~~thunyxxx~~ They will be, however, hopped-up with viands, because it is scarce within their avenues of patrol.

## K. ENEMY ACTIVITIES:

## 1. Ground movements:-

0730 HRS, 1 Jan '45 - 1 truck from Fabrica, arrives Central Lopez convoyed by 4 Jap soldiers. They were armed with 4-6.5mm (.256 inch) ARISAKA rifles.

0730 HRS, 1 Jan '45 - 5 trucks from Fabrica passed Central Lopez loaded with 150 Japs armed with 140-6.5 mm (.256 inch) ARISAKA rifles, 3-50mm M69 HGD & 3-6.5mm (.256 inch) Type 96 (1936) LMGs. At

(\*) IN San Carlos Area with her strong defenses and reported sufficient of food and supply, the enemy despite of her "chicken-fie" strength compared to the friendly units now concentrating against SCHOC garrison, is still capable to sustain the main in her present helpless position. No indication so far that she will withdraw San Carlos, may be because of its strategic location. On the contrary, it was lately observed she was strengthening defenses by constructing iron plates barricades around the boiling house which is predicted as their last defense line. She has also a RADIC TRANSMITTER located in the laboratory. With this apparatus she could easily get reinforcement by air in case of any foreseen imminent danger. Until this RADIC transmitter is put out into action and her strong defenses destroyed, before asking for "SOS" then it is a suicide to assault this garrison with the aim in view of capturing the garrison. We will, however, be successful to rescue this garrison from time being by bypassing the shipping area.

(b) In Sogay area contentsions almost the same as (a) above. This is, however, a stronger force than in Cen. China, so that it is still believed, they are very much capable to launch counter-offensive, if they resort to, against the friendly left in that area.
