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1. OBSERVATIONS: Same as in previous report, except that the weather of San Carlos has been observed to be fortified, and that the bitter weather of allied troops at Paria are being killed up. In De so Fort the army is busy digging foxholes, and building trenches.

They are performing well as far as observed they are making some progress in the direction of the town. They are great for firing and shooting. (Lt. Loggia) f. Address: 1. Clothing -- inadequate, they wear patched clothes. (Lt. Loggia) g. Relations between officials and soldiers -- Fairly good.

2. MAINTENANCE:-

1. Conditions -- As in previous report, the reinforcements brought their own necessities. They have dug out areas and areas to pits and ditches. 2. Food supply -- In Central zone, there is an addition of six (6) boxes of ammunition from the bridge. In San Carlos there are eight (8) air plane bombs consigned with each area and support leave. Under the name of San Carlos there are fourteen (14) boxes of shells for trucks and for trucks. (Loggia) 2. Food supply -- S&CO. They have been observed eating rice mixed with water. (Loggia) They get their food supplies from the town and nearby. It was observed for most areas, like amotes. (Lt. Loggia)

3. ADMINISTRATIVE:-

3. BATTLE OPERATIONS:-

1. Operation of 17 Jan '43 - 100 (8) trucks from Central Line sent to large loads with 30 tons. They were armed with 27-3 mm (4 machine) machine rifles, two (2) 6.5 mm (3.5 inch) type 03 (1935) light and 1-3 mm heavy grade Discharger, returned at 1000 hrs of same day. 1900 hrs, 10 Jan '43 - One (1) truck loaded with 100 (2) 3 mm (2) rifles sent to support from support line to see the area where the allied troops were located. They were 27-3 mm (3.5 inch) machine rifles and several machineguns. Returned at 1000 hrs of same day. 1100 hrs, 17 Jan '43 - 100 (8) trucks from Central Line sent to support line. They were armed with 27-3 mm (3.5 inch) machine rifles, 1-3 mm heavy grade Discharger and 27-3 mm (3.5 inch) type 03 (1935) light. Returned at 1000 hrs of same day. 1200 hrs, 17 Jan '43 - 150 (10) trucks from support line sent to support line with their full provisions of supplies. They were armed with 27-3 mm (3.5 inch) machine rifles, 1-3 mm heavy grade Discharger and 27-3 mm (3.5 inch) type 03 (1935) light. Returned at 1000 hrs of same day. 1300 hrs, 17 Jan '43 - 30 (3) trucks from support line sent to support line with their full provisions of supplies. They were armed with 27-3 mm (3.5 inch) machine rifles, 1-3 mm heavy grade Discharger and 27-3 mm (3.5 inch) type 03 (1935) light. Returned at 1000 hrs of same day to Central Line.

1500 HRS, 18 Jan '45- 2 trucks from Fabrics arrived Central Lopez loaded with 20 mine armed with 16-5 (0.255 inch) ANISAKA rifles, 2-8.8mm (0.285 inch) Type 96 (1936) light machine guns several hand grenades.

2100 HRS, 18 Jan '45- 1 truck from Fabrics arrived Sager's camp with 40 mine armed with 16-5 (0.255 inch) ANISAKA rifles. Returned with 40 mine stationed at Sager's camp leaving behind 40 strong.

1200 HRS, 20 Jan '45- 8 mine from Sager's camp went to Malabon near Lilio Vitevit. They were armed with 16-5 (0.255 inch) ANISAKA rifles. Purpose to escape from bombing. At 1000 hrs of same day they returned. (Lt. Legaspi)

1700 HRS, 20 Jan '45- 1 truck from Central Lopez loaded with 12 mine went to Crossing Sager's. They were armed with 11-6.5mm (0.255 inch) Type 92 (1936) light machine gun.

1800 HRS, 21 Jan '45- 2 Japs Engineers armed with 8-6.8mm (0.255 inch) ANISAKA rifles went to San Juan Agustin on foot. They asked wine, whiskey and tobacco from civilians. At 1800 hrs of same day they returned to Central Lopez. (Lt. Legaspi)

0900 HRS, 21 Jan '45- 1 truck from Central Lopez loaded with 2 Japs soldiers went to Crossing Sager's. Armed with 8-6.8mm (0.255 inch) ANISAKA rifles and hand grenades. At 1700 HRS of same day they returned. (Lt. Legaspi)

SAGER'S- 1700 HRS, 21 Jan '45- 1 Jap was either killed or wounded when he attempted to catch a civilian planted as a decoy in our boys 200 yards from the Commissary Store. 12 Japs tried to encircle the said decoy but our boys detected the plan and the plan was foiled, Jap went back to the garrison. (Lt. Exaltado)

1800 HRS, 22 Jan '45- 3 mine with civilians went out the garrison 200 yards from the barb wire line the town to gather vegetables and fuel. Our boys fired at them and inflicted 3 civilians casualties. (Lt. Exaltado)

SAGER'S- 0800 HRS, 22 Jan '45- 36 mine from Central Lopez went to Oro on foot bringing with them their arms to escape from bombing. At 1500 hrs of same day they returned.

0800 HRS, 22 Jan '45- 1 truck from Central Lopez went to Crossing Sager's loaded with 4 mine armed with 8-6.8mm (0.255 inch) ANISAKA rifles and 8-8mm (0.255 inch) Type 96 (1936) light machine gun. Returned at 1800 HRS of same day. (Lt. Legaspi)

1200 HRS, 23 Jan '45- 1 mine from Sager's went to sitio Comunal to look for Carabao. They were armed with 4-0.6 mm (0.255 inch) ANISAKA rifles. Returned at 1500 HRS of same day. (Lt. Legaspi)

1800 HRS, 27 Jan '45- 5 trucks from Fabrics went to the landing field loaded with 20 mine and many civilians. They loaded the boat and after a short time the mine bombings returned 0700 HRS, 28 Jan '45. (Lt. Legaspi)

0600 HRS, 24 Jan '45- 1 cargo truck with 20 mine all armed with 8-8mm (0.255 inch) ANISAKA rifles went to Sager's. Returned at 1700 HRS of same day. (Lt. Legaspi)

1800 HRS, 24 Jan '45- 3 mine with civilians went out the 2000 200 yards from the barb wire line the town to forest for some vegetables. Our boys fired upon them no casualties. Mine didn't fire back. (Lt. Exaltado)

1200 HRS, 24 Jan '45- 3 mine from Sager's garrison armed with 16-5 (0.255 inch) ANISAKA rifles went to San Juan Agustin to loot chickens from the civilians. They returned at 1700 HRS of same day.

1500 HRS, 24 Jan '45- 2 trucks from Fabrics loaded with 12 mine and sacks of rice left for Central Lopez. The soldiers were all armed with ANISAKA rifles only.

1100 hrs, 28 Jan '45 - 2 trucks from 1st truck company, (Lt Leasing) sent to the landing field with 40 M1A1 rifles and 1-2 mm (0.50 inch) machine guns. They returned at 1200 hrs of same day. (Lt Leasing)

1200 hrs, 28 Jan '45 - 1 truck from Fabricia sent to the landing field with 40 M1A1 rifles and 1-2 mm (0.50 inch) machine guns. They returned at 1200 hrs of same day. (Lt Leasing)

1200 hrs, 28 Jan '45 - 1 truck sent to the landing field with 40 M1A1 rifles and 1-2 mm (0.50 inch) machine guns. They returned at 1200 hrs of same day. (Lt Leasing)

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0° 20' North Latitude, 124° 25' East Longitude; From the North heading South. (Lt. Skaltico)

2000 HRS, 29 Jan '45- One Victor 4's situated at 30° North Latitude and 49° Longitude, fixed at the 11th hour north it got there were no casualties inflicted. Direction from North to South. (Lt. Legaspi)

1500 HRS, 29 Jan '45-1 Victor 4's cocked at 30° 30' North heading one hotel with loads-unverified, however, most probable loads were made from program for CMO. This was from North. (Lt. Skaltico)

0900 HRS, 29 Jan '45-1 Victor 4's and 1 other cocked at 30° 30' North heading were fired upon by the 60 cal AA emplacements at the seashore of San Carlos from 0900 hours. The hotel was hit by the M-1's to cook for a person; the Victor 4's also undergoing major repairs. (Lt. Skaltico)

2000 HRS, 29 Jan '45-1 Victor 4's left 30° 30' North heading probably to fabric, heavily loaded with unknown cargoes. (Lt. Skaltico)

1800 HRS, 29 Jan '45- 2 Victor 4's left 30° 30' North heading probably to fabric, loaded with approximately sixty (60) M-1's and other cargoes; most probably G-1 sheets and iron plates and steel. (Lt. Skaltico)

III. AERIAL MOVEMENTS:- See attached tabulated form.

IV. MISCELLANEOUS:

0700 HRS, 16 Jan '45- 2 Allied planes strafed 377 by Japanese and Tingo. 3 Jap soldiers along in the civilian houses near Tingo were hit and killed. 0740 of same day, 2 Allied planes bombed Bengis. ammunition boxes were hit and burned; trenches and foxholes were directly hit but however there was no casualty inflicted on the part of the enemy. This attack caused the Japs to evacuate to 100 meters N from Basilio Memorial School and to demolish part of Central Garage on the other side of the River. (Lt. Legaspi)

0000 HRS, 16 Jan '45-1 truck went to Crossing Ferry loaded with 8 Jap soldiers. They inspected the road where the blasting of the 1st block took place. (Lt. Legaspi)

0800 HRS, 16 Jan '45- 2 Jap soldiers often go to Maloca, they supposedly to look for stuffs from the divisions. They are armed with 9.8mm (0.386 inch) ARCADE rifles. Returned in the afternoon. (Lt. Skaltico)

10 Jan '45- In the middle of the left side of Segun Elementary School is heavily barricaded with thick lumber and pill boxes. Part of the facade about 1 meter later was cut off as an exit to the east side under one of the trenches with 80mm west of said road. The construction of the trenches is 1 meter deep, 1 1/2 meters wide at the mouth and 1 meter wide at the base with the approximate length of 40 meters extending east. (Lt. Legaspi)

One air-raid shelter indicated about 15 meters N from the stairs and 1 1/2 from 20 to 40 meters east from the edge of the left wing. These are connected with trenches. (Lt. Legaspi)

17 Jan '45- At present there are 2 trucks stationed at Marcelo and Carlos Lopez's houses. These trucks are used in case of any eventuality. (Lt. Legaspi)

1300 HRS, 17 Jan '45- 3 Allied planes bombed and strafed Central Lopez area and hit Marcelo's house and Central dock. 4 trucks were hit and burned. Food supplies in Marcelo's house were burned and 17 Jap soldiers were killed. In Central dock 2 Jap soldiers were killed and 3 wounded, rendering the dock useless. Some of the bombs hit near Marcelo's house (Lt. Legaspi)

1830 HRS, 18 Jan '45- Allied plane was crashed off

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1800 hrs, 20 Jan '45-15 Allied planes bombed the landing fields and houses were destroyed near Sanjay and Bonelas. One C-47, N170, which is about 2 1/2 kms. east of the landing field, was hit. It was also observed that Japanese soldiers were 2000 yds. away from the landing fields in the vicinity of Sanjay. (Lt. Legaspi)

25 Jan '45- The enemy has the intention to patrol the vicinity of Sanjay in the radius of 4 kms. from their positions to look for our soldiers and to destroy their offices. (Lt. Legaspi)

1800 hrs, 25 Jan '45-2 C-47s landed Sabirca airport. There are 4 Oscars presently stationed at the said airport.

The enemy are still working at night in the Sabirca airfield. (Lt. Legaspi)

1800 hrs, 28 Jan '45- 8 Allied planes tried to strafed Sanjay airfield but they were fired first by the AEC guns. No casualties on both sides.

The Japs are observed eating rice mixed with canotes due to the shortage of food. (Lt. Legaspi)

200 hrs, 30 Jan '45-2 N170 were observed hit by automatic rifle of 75th battery under Lt. McGuigan on patrol in the vicinity of Sanjay. (Lt. Legaspi)

21 Jan '45-N170 aircraft at San Carlos about 20 (mobile patrol). The engine in 20000. These N170 that replaced the previous aircraft in 20000 are restive and aggressive. (Lt. Legaspi)

The government wharf at the town proper is being fortified by the Japs. Accurate location of the fortification is under verification. Iron plate (planks) and steel from the electric plant were the materials being used for fortification. Civil planes in the control (20000) are being utilized for the project under the supervision of the Japs soldiers. (Lt. Legaspi)

0100 hrs, 30 Jan '45- Japs still occupy town of San Carlos. Our boys are occupying positions outside of town. (Lt. Legaspi)

0700 hrs, 31 Jan '45-4 Allied planes bombed and strafed Sanjay airfield. One aircraft hit; 2 AEC AEC guns destroyed; 4 N170 killed; part of the house of Mr. Escudero Lopez was damaged. (Lt. Legaspi)

0730 hrs, of same day, 4 Allied planes bombed and strafed Bonelas. Results:- No casualties was inflicted. (Lt. Legaspi)

ENEMY INTENTIONS AND CAPACITIES:-

SAN CARLOS:- A strong corps of periodic reinforcements. Fresh troops are being supplied capable of operations and maintaining our present position. There is still no indication so far that the enemy will withdraw from San Carlos because of our strategic location. It has also lately been observed that the two wings of San Carlos are being fortified.

SAN JAY:- This is however, a strong force that can be used. It is still believed that they are very much capable to launch counter-offensive, if they report to against the friendly unit in that area. This is shown by the reorganization of the 20000 (aerobats).

They must have known the American campaign both in the Visayas, Mindanao and in Luzon since they had the zero hour of American landing in this island, they were concentrate to the forests to join a larger force most probably by sea due to the construction of launches in Becner Bayshore, and of the repairing of the launch and other at San Carlos during the war.

CONCLUSION:- Our facilities will always be put into account.

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RECOMMENDATIONS:-

1. Food shortage is felt by the enemy. We could never allow the enemy to forage for food if our boys have enough ammo. As it has been reported no interception of the enemy foraging for food in the area due to lack of ammo.

2. In attacking a particular enemy position there must be coordinated air support for better result.

0800 HRS, 11 Jan '45 - ~~xxxxxxx~~ 1 truck from Fabrica went to Sagay loaded with 6 Japs, armed with 6-8.5mm (0.266 inch) ARISAKA rifles. They returned 1300 HRS, same day.

1100 HRS, 11 Jan '45 - 3 trucks from Central Lopez loaded with 28 Japs went to Hsa Ye-on to garrison thereat. They were armed with 24-8.5mm (0.266 inch) ARISAKA rifles, & 2-8.5mm (0.266 inch) Type 98 (1936) MGs.

1400 HRS, 11 Jan '45 - 2 trucks from Central Lopez went to Sagay loaded with 20 Japs armed with several 8.5mm (0.266 inch) ARISAKA rifles and 2-8.5mm (0.266 inch) Type 98 (1936) MGs.

0700 HRS, 13 Jan '45 - 2 trucks from Central Lopez (1 truck loaded with 5 Japs and the other loaded with supplies and 4 Japs) went to Sagay. They were armed with 10-8.5mm (0.266 inch) ARISAKA rifles.

1300 HRS, 15 Jan '45 - 1 truck from Fabrica passed Central Lopez bound for Cr. Sagay loaded with 8 Japs. They were armed with 8-8.5mm (0.266 inch) ARISAKA rifles. They returned at 1600 HRS, same day.

1600 HRS, 16 Jan '45 - 2 trucks from Central Lopez loaded with 12 Japs went to Hsa San Agustin. They were armed with 10-8.5mm (0.266 inch) ARISAKA rifles & 2-8.5mm (0.266 inch) NAMBU MGs. They returned at 1630 HRS, same day.

IV. MISCELLANEOUS.

0600 HRS, 1 Jan '45 - 12 Lockheed attacked Fabrica Airport. The MPA fired their AAGs and hit one of the Allice planes. The plane was on flame from the air, fell or crashed near Quinaluzan, Sagay.

1300 HRS, 1 Jan '45 - 13 Allied Bombers passed t Sagay area flying very low and bombed Fabrica Airport. 1 Allice plane was shot down by AAGs.

Pilots of the Lockheed and Light Bomber that were hit were all killed and burned.

0700 HRS, 3 Jan '45 - Two (2) Allied planes strafed and bombed the Fabrica Airport near SaAgay and Tinago, but there was no damage done. At 1200 HRS, same day 2 allied planes again strafed the SaAgay Garrison & inflicted a casualty of 4 sentry guards killed and 1 enemy plane was hit and burned 150 meters from the garrison. Again at 1600 HRS of the same day, 3 Allied planes attacked or raided the Airport. The ammo dump which is 250 meters NW from Tinago was hit and burned.

ABOGADOS; DESCATO.—Cuando un abogado hace en su alegato acres censuras y desmedidos ataques contra el juzgado o juez que vió y falló la causa, los cuales no estan fundados en las pruebas obrantes en el RECORD, procede una condena por descato, de acuerdo con la resolución del Tribunal Supremo de fecha 24 de diciembre de 1932, 31 Gaceta Oficial, No. 4, pág. 113.

Se condena al abogado Abelardo Hilado a pagar una multa de cincuenta pesos.

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0900 ZED, 2 Jan '48 - 1 Oscar bombed and strafed San Carlos. No casualty.

0900 ZED, 2 Jan '48 - 2 Oscars bombed and strafed the vicinity of San Carlos. Bombs dropped 500 yards from the island tower. Bombs dropped 1200-1300 yards from the island tower. Bombs in the vicinity of San Carlos and Gialyon. Bombs east of the landing field. Bombs were dropped in these places. Bombs hit houses and buildings. Bombs hit the fabric airport. Some of the bombs were dropped in the vicinity. Only one bomb hit near the San Carlos. A part of the ammunition dump was hit and a civilian house in Maloben and one in Vito-vito were also hit and burned.

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(a) In San Carlos area with her strong defenses and reported sufficient of food and ammo supply, the enemy despite of her "chicken-fee" strength compared to the friendly units now concentrating against San Carlos is still expected to defend the main in her present hold position. No indication so far that she will withdraw San Carlos, may be because of its strategic location. On the contrary, it was lately observed she was strengthening defenses by constructing upon plate barricades around the boiling house which is predicted as their last defense line. She has also a RADIO TRANSMITTER located in the laboratory. With this apparatus she could easily get reinforcement by air in case of any foreseen imminent danger. Thus, this RADIO TRANSMITTER is put out into action and her strong defenses destroyed, before asking for "SOS" then it is a suicide to assault this garrison with the aim in view of capturing the garrison. We will, however, be successful to reduce this garrison from time to time by harassing and sniping only.

(b) In Sogay area conditions almost the same as (a) above. This is, however, a stronger force than in San Carlos, so that it is still believed, they are very much capable to launch counter-offensive, if they resort to, against the friendly unit in that area.
